

Writing the Civil War



Literary Historian Rob Velella

Discover the dynamic relationship between America's Civil War and 19th century American literature, with an emphasis on writers from New England. Ultimately, the war transformed American writing. This illustrated talk presents works that both inspire action and reflect on war-time traumas. Several writers will be discussed but particular emphasis will be placed on Nathaniel Hawthorne, who died 150 years ago this month, as well as the novelist's surprising connections to Waltham.

About the lecturer



Waltham native Rob Velella is an independent literary historian and playwright specializing in American literature of the 19th century. A Waltham native, Velella has published articles and presented academic papers on figures as varied as Margaret Fuller, Oliver Wendell Holmes, and Walt Whitman. His most recent publication, a chapter on Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, was included in the compilation Reconsidering Longfellow (Fairleigh Dickinson University Press, 2014).

Nicknamed the "Prometheus of American literary scholarship," he has taken his research outside of academia by lecturing at various historical sites, libraries, and colleges from Pennsylvania to Maine. Recently, he

served as guest curator for "Margaret Fuller: Woman of the Nineteenth Century" at Harvard's Houghton Library and as research associate for "The Raven in the Frog Pond: Edgar Allan Poe and Boston" for the Boston Public Library.

In his ongoing efforts to bring the writers of yesterday back to the readers of today, he has dramatically brought to life several literary figures, including the young Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, Nathaniel Hawthorne, and Edgar Allan Poe. Velella also maintains the American Literary Blog (http://www.americanliteraryblog.blogspot.com/), an "almost-daily celebration of important (and not-so-important) dates in 19th-century American literary history."



Curator's Corner

We are continuing to move forward with the Bright School setup. In preparation for our move of the collections from our holdings at Moody Street and the Garage space, two rooms have been cleared. We have designated these rooms to be available for temporary storage. These rooms will act as a holding location while the processing and cataloging of the collection and proper designation for permanent storage at the Bright School is worked on.

During our recent move of the materials from the storage closet at Moody Street (with the wonderful help of the Bentley students) we came across three un-processed collections. Two of which have been recently processed by the curator, and the third collection is in the works. Here are some of the highlights of the two processed collections: First processed, was the papers of city councilor, Paul Giunta. The collection is comprised of his paperwork from 1963-1994. These materials deal with his time as a city councilor, including Councilor Giunta's work on city planning, capital improvement projects and his work on the hazardous material committee. The next collection processed was the material dealing with the 1924 labor strike at the Waltham Watch Company. The material included such things as administrative records from the Watch Company, labor records, minutes of the Watch Company newsletter and numerous articles from the Waltham News Tribune reporting on the strike. The third group is a collection of material from the Grover Cronin's Department Store, which the curator will report on in the next newsletter.

In Addition to this work, the curator is continuing work on the large Waltham Hospital Collection that was donated to the Society last year. This collection is currently, about 75% processed.

Many of you may be asking, "What does processed mean?"

To "Process" a collection. the materials are first sorted and compiled in our Temporary Storage rooms at the Bright School. Next, all staples, rubber bands and fasteners are removed. Then all photographs, documents or objects are carefully transferred to new archival quality folders, boxes or sleeves (where necessary). Next the collection is given an item number. Then, a scope and content note (which briefly describes the collection) and a box list and/or finding aid is compiled. This information is then logged into our master catalog. The final step is giving the newly processed collection a storage location in our Permanent Archival Storage space at the Bright School.

As you can see, lots of work is taking place and we still have lots of work left to do, but we are getting ever closer to giving our collection of materials a new home at the Bright School.
