

# **Revolutionary Waltham**

The Waltham Historical Society has been in contact with Mr. Richard Sanderson, descendant of the famous Sandersons of Waltham. Mr. Sanderson is in the process of writing a book documenting the actions of Waltham's soldiers who fought during our country's struggle for Independence.

We are working to help Mr. Sanderson tell the story of the role played by Waltham's Minute Men and Militia, with an eye towards the days and months leading up to the midnight ride of Paul Revere.

Through the efforts of Mr. Sanderson we have learned that the Waltham militia turned out that day and saw action sufficient to draw pay for 4 days service and 28 miles travelled.



Books have been written claiming that the Waltham militia were never alarmed or "slept through it."

Close examination reveals that 156 Waltham Men turned out and were made it to Lexington in the afternoon, arriving in time to dodge canon fire.

### In Provincial Congress,

Cambridge, October 26, 1774.

Present unbappy Disputes between Great-Britum and the Colonies, a formidable Body of Troops with workhe Preparations of every Sort are already arrived at, and others defined for the Metropolis of this Province, and the expression of special of the Province is to execute Ails of the British Parliament, utterly subversive of the Constitution of the Province: And wibsreas bis Excellency General Gage has attempted by his Troops to disperse the Inhabitants of Salem, whill slighted to consist Measures for preserving their Freedom; and to subjugate the Province to arbitrary Government;—And proceeding to still more unjustifiable and alarming Lengths has Fortised against the Country the Capital of the Province, and thus greatly endangered the Lives, Liberties and Properties of its oppressed of the Province, and thus greatly endangered the Lives, Liberties and Properties of its oppressed Citizens:—invaded private Property by unlawfully seizing and retaining large Quantities of Amminition in the Arseal at Boston and spartly cross of Ordanace in the same Town—committed to the Chyslody of his Troops the Arms, Ammunition, Ordanace and Warlibe Stores of all Sorts, provided at the Public Expence for the Use of the Province, and by all possible Means endeavoured to place the Province entirely in a desence of the Control of the Province, and by all possible Means endeavoured to place the Province, and Intreasirs that be would cease from Measures which tended to prevent a Restoration of Harmony between Great-Britain and the Colonies:

Wherefore it is the Opinion of this Congress—That notwithstanding nothing has claused.

Wherefore it is the Opinion of this Congress—That notwithstanding nothing but Slavery ought more to be deprecated than Hostilities with Great-Britain—notwithstanding the Prowince has not the most distant Design of attacking, annoying or molesting his Majesty.

Troops aforefaid, but on the other Hand will consider and treat every Attempt of the Kind as well as all Measures tending to prevent a Reconciliation between Britain and the Colonies as the highest Degree of Emmity to the Province—Nevertheles there is great Reason from the Considerations aforesaid, to be apprehensive of the most state Consequences; and that the Province may be in some Degree provided against the same, and under full Persuation that the Measures expressed in the following Resolves are perfectly consistent with such Resolves of the Continental Congress as have been communicated to us.

It is Resolved, and hereby Recommended to the several Companies of Militia in this Province, who have not already chosen and appointed Officers, that they meet forthwith, and elect Officers to Command their respective Companies; and that the Officers so chosen as season as may be; and where the said Officers shall judge the Limits of the present Regiments too extensive, that they divide them, and settle and determine their Limits, and proceed to elect Field Officers to Command the respective Regiments so formed; and that the Field Officers so elected, forthwith endeavour to enlist one Quarter at the least of the Number of the respective Companies, and form them into Companies of stifty Privates at the least, who shall equip and hold themselves in Readiness to march at the shortest Notice; and that each and every Company so formed, choose a Captain and two Lieutenants to comband them on any necessary and emergent Service: And that the said Captain and Subalterns of each Battalion for formed proceed to elect Field Officers to command the mon any necessary and emergent Service: And that the Said Companies each; and that the Captains and Subalterns of each Battalion for formed proceed to elect Field Officers to command the special subservation and generous Regard to the public Service.

Also Resolved. That as the Security of the Live

felves therewith; and that they use their utmost Diligence to perfect themselves in Military Skill; and that if any Town or District within the Province is not provided with the ful Town Stock of Arms and Ammunition according to Law, the Selectmen of fisch Town or Diffrict take effectual Care without Delay to provide the fame.

A true Extract from the Minutes.

BENJAMIN LINCOLN, Sec'ry

Some of the evidence turned up by Mr. Sanderson and the Society show that 12 officers and 144 men marched from the corner of Lincoln and Lexington Streets on that morning.

After examination of materials thus far uncovered, we know the "who, what, when, and where," but not the details of "why." Through research into official recorded histories much has been uncovered. But, recent reviews of newspaper articles from the Centennial celebrations of 1875-76, and the personal journals and diaries of women and young people we have become aware of the reason for Waltham's perceived absence.

On these pages are images that have contributed to the uncovering of evidence that Waltham participated on April 19, 1775.

## In Provincial Congress,

Cambridge, Feuruary 14, 1775.

HERE AS it appears and fary for the Defence of the work, Liberties, and Property the Inhabitants of this Province, that this Congress on the first of their next Session, should be made fully acquainted with the Number and Military Equipments of the Militia, and Minute Men in this Province and also the Town Stock of Ammunition in each Town and District:

It is therefore RESOLVED, That it be and it is hereby recommended, to the commanding Officers of each Regiment of Minute Men, that now is or shall be formed in this Province, that they review the several Companies in their respective Regiments, or cause them to be reviewed, and take an exact State of their Numbers, and Equipment,—and where there is any Companythat is not incorporated into a Regiment, the commanding Officer thereof shall review the several Companies, or cause them to be reviewed, and take a like State of their Numbers and Equipment—And is also recommended to the Colonels or commanding Officers of each Regiment of Militia in this Province, that they review the several Companies in their respective Regiments, or cause them to be reviewed, and take a State of their Numbers and Accouttements; which said State of the Minute Men and Militia, shall be by said Officers returned in Writing to this Congress, on the first Day of their Scission after the Adjournment.—

And it is further RESOLVED, That it be recommended to the Select-Men of each Town and Diffrict in the Province, that on the same Day they make return in Writing of the State of the Town and Diffrict Stock of Ammunition, and War-like Stores to this Congress.



Above is a copy of the map made in February of 1775 by Ensign Henry DeBerniere and Captain John Brown showing the known and most direct roads between Boston and Concord. At the bottom is Roxbury Neck, the only land-based means of egress from the Town of Boston. One important take-away from this map is the absence of the Cambridge Reservoir.



### Revolutionary Waltham (continued)

The following was submitted as proof of service by the Waltham Company upon the Alarm of April 19, 1775. It lists the men, their rank, the miles travelled, and the number of days served.

"Company in Waltham Called out by Colonel Thomas Gardner on Alarm in defense of the Liberties of America under the Command of Abraham Peirce, Capt., to Concord and Lexington fights and the number of miles traveled and boor our Expenses and these Lins may sartifle that my Company was Kept upon guard till Saturday the 4th day after the fight at Concord.

Nothing appears in the town records to indicate the struggles at Lexington and Concord, and it is difficult to determine how many of Waltham's sons took part in those conflicts, but some were there. David Smith, an apprentice to Phineas Stearns, was wounded by the bursting of his gun at Lexington.
