In this presentation, David will explain to his audience, how **we** have evolved from what our Founding Fathers had envisioned, not only by their words, but by their deeds. And, how this great Nation evolved from the thirteen small colonies who dared to break from the mightiest nation on earth. They chose a new form of Government that has never been copied in two hundred years. They set out with a vision, based on documents that spoke to the passions of all.

This presentation is special because we are in the midst of celebrating and honoring The Civil War Sesquicentennial, of which David is Commissioner.

David will explain how this “experiment” began to falter, eventually leading to a fratricidal Civil War, costing over 600,000 of our Country’s population and spanning four of the most savage and bloody years of our History.

Before realizing the effects of this War, we grew into a Nation that appears contrary to the original vision. Much of this started in 1862 with the passing of an Income Tax on persons and businesses, which was seen as a method for Lincoln to fund the Union war effort. This illegal tax was repealed by The Supreme Court in 1895, and in 1913 the 16th Amendment to our Constitution created a legal Income Tax, and brought meaning to some of the words that we hold so dear, such as:

**“No Taxation Without Representation.”**

David will speak to **“all of those wonderful words that we hold so dear”** by explaining the true meaning of these words, while the country grew from a small group of Colonies into a Government of bureaucratic Oversight Committees and Regulatory Agencies.

Our Declaration of Independence, United States Constitution, Emancipation Proclamation, Gettysburg Address, and a few more documents, have kept this Nation in a continued period of growth in Power, Freedom, and Liberty.
