First Waltham Historical Society Trolley Tour a Big Success

On February 27, 2010 the first Historical Society Trolley Tour was conducted. Departing from 760 Main Street, we traveled to the Robert Treat Paine Estate on Beaver Street.

The Trolley was very nearly full as it traveled across the City to tour one of Waltham's historic gems.

Greeting us at the door to the Estate, Curator Ann Clifford welcomed us into the home and introduced us to the architecture, the history, and the family associated with the property.

We were able to view the specially designed grand room whose ceiling is suspended from a truss in the roof.

We walked through the home and viewed portraits of the Paine family, once occupants of the estate.

Wood is a prominent feature in the interior of the structure. All the stones used in the construction of the house and garden walls were collected on the property.



Ms. Clifford pointed out the original location of the oldest portion of the structure, and discussed the significance of the architecture, and architects, as we made our way through the house and grounds.

Many innovative technologies were used in the house including a windmill that pumped ground water to a storage tank in the attic which supplied water to the house.

Electricity was adopted by the Paines in 1886, shortly after it first appeared in New York City in 1884.

On to the Watch Factory



Upon completion of our tour of Stonehurst, we next traveled to the former Waltham Watch Factory to view the recently completed exhibit created by the collaborative efforts of the Charles River Museum of Industry and Innovation, Berkeley Associates, and the Waltham Historical Society.



The exhibit highlights the many important roles the factory and the watch making business played in Waltham's history.

Commission Discusses how Three Possible Local Historic Districts Might be Established

Local historic districts would allow local governing bodies to limit changes in some external features of buildings within them. Establishing 'LHDs' can be a more effective preservation tool than inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places, which is 'prestigious' but offers historic buildings little protection from demolition.

WHC will apply for state funding to do feasibility studies on Moody Street, Ellison Park/Lyman Sts, and Piety Corner local historic districts. This requires the Mayor's approval, which is likely. The process of actually establishing LHDs is complex, requires input from local residents and 2/3's approval by City Council, and is likely to take two years.

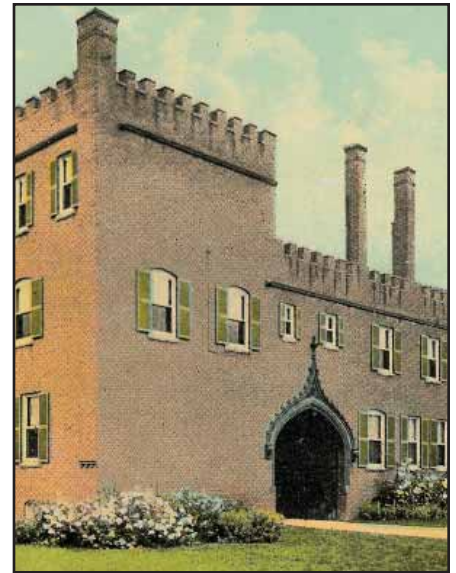
Update on Threatened Historic Properties

Demolition delays remain in effect until mid-June on 385 and 1767 Trapelo Road.

The 'Brooks House' at 546 Moody St. remains protected from demolition, in effect, until TD Bank can secure all the City Council permits necessary for its planned facility there.

Sachem Realty is planning a mixed residential/retail building on the sites of 425 River and 62 Elm Sts, and have secured most of the permits. This area was the former site of a major railroad complex, and Sachem's project (Station Landing) will include an exterior marker, and photographs and possibly memorabilia in the lobby.
